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
Three Acts of a Play

Act One is a preparation act for the viewer or reader. They are asking who is the hero.

This is the most important act in the drama because you have the two most important structural moves in the story.

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Five Components of a Plot



<u>1. Exposition</u>: At the beginning of the story, the characters and setting are established. The conflict or main problem is also introduced.

2. Rising Action: Introduction of the Problem or Conflict

After the characters and main problem have been established, the main problem or conflict is dealt with by some kind of action. This crisis causes tension and excitement. How does the character take to that crisis?

3.Climax: The High Point

The climax is the high point of the story with a high point of suspense. The turning point may be either physical or emotional. What will happen in the story?

4. Falling Action: Winding Down

The story begins to wind down. We start to see the result of the actions or decisions the character has made. This leads to the crisis resolution.

5. Resolution: The End

Now, the conflicts are resolved, all loose ends are tied up, and the story concludes with either a happy or sad ending.
